Formal reflection (which includes reflection for revalidation) With the mandatory requirement from the Nursing and Midwifery Council (NMC) to revalidate every three years, the need to provide five reflective accounts has become compulsory.³ This is formal reflection, as evidence must be produced to demonstrate that you have learned from events and developed your practice.

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practice.
